#### SONGWRITING WORKSHOP

This term the Music Department welcomed the wonderful Cally Rhodes into school, to give us her best tips and advice on songwriting skills. Cally is a singer/songwriter originally from Wales, but currently living in Northern Ireland. Her own original compositions have now been streamed over 150 million times online and she has had viral success in mainland China with two songs! Closer to home, her music has been played on BBC radio 1, BBC radio 2, BBC radio Wales, Kiss FM, Capitol radio and also used on Strictly Come Dancing, Love Island, Made in Chelsea and Love is Blind. Cally brought all her industry knowledge to the table when she talked to our pupils about how to approach the idea of songwriting and gave us some sneaky insights into her own methods. She then guided the pupils through the process of getting started with some lyrics and chords, so by the end of our sessions we were enjoying some live performances of new compositions by our own pupils! Cally was so encouraging and helpful to us and we really enjoyed our experience of being songwriters for the day!











#### **ADA LOVELACE DAY 2025 - CELEBRATING WOMEN IN STEM**

To celebrate Ada Lovelace Day this year, we hosted a mix of activities that aimed to spark curiosity, build confidence and celebrate student talent. The day began with a special video assembly created and delivered by our IT Prefects and senior IT students. Focusing on the benefits of a career in technology, the assembly encouraged pupils to imagine themselves as the next generation of innovators, leaders and problem-solvers in the tech industry.

Our Year 11 IT students also enjoyed a careers talk from Nikkala, a Senior Software Engineer at Kainos. She shared her personal journey into the world of software engineering, provided real insight into what a career in tech looks like, and highlighted the exciting opportunities available for women entering this field.

In the run-up to Ada Lovelace Day, the whole school took part in a series of fun and creative competitions. Students put their ICT knowledge to the test through a range of digital challenges, quizzes and design activities celebrating women in STEM. A special thank-you goes to our generous sponsors—Fujitsu, Kainos and Allstate—whose support helped us reward creativity and enthusiasm with fantastic prizes.

At junior lunch in the Atrium, our Ada Challenges proved incredibly popular. Pupils made colourful binary bracelets, tackled the Retro Tech Challenge quiz, and took part in the Inspirational Women quiz, with winners receiving well-deserved prizes. The Maths Department also joined the celebration by running an engaging Caesar Cipher code-breaking activity, giving students the chance to explore cryptography and problem-solving through a STEM lens. Ada Lovelace Day 2025 was a wonderful celebration of creativity, curiosity and the achievements of women in technology. #### 11SA2 TAKE PART IN AI, ONLINE SAFETY AND ROBOTICS WORKSHOPS

Our Year 11 class, 11SA2, recently had the exciting opportunity to participate in a brand-new outreach programme offered to post-primary schools across Belfast: Stay Safe Online, Explore Artificial Intelligence & Robotics for Fun. The three-part workshop series introduced pupils to some of the most important and fast-growing areas in the digital world—online safety, artificial intelligence (AI), and robotics. Through interactive sessions, the girls learned practical strategies for staying safe online and protecting their personal data. They also explored how AI models recognise images, faces and emotions using tools such as Google's Teachable Machine, giving them real insight into the technology behind everyday applications.

One of the highlights was the hands-on robotics activities, where students programmed small robots to complete a range of simple challenges. This not only strengthened their problem-solving and computational thinking skills but also gave them a sense of achievement as they watched their code come to life.

The programme aims to build essential digital skills and inspire students to explore future pathways in computing and technology—a perfect fit for our Information Technology curriculum.

To conclude the experience, pupils from 11SA2 will visit Ulster University's Belfast Campus, where they will attend talks on AI and Robotics, try out a variety of demonstrations including VR and Formula 1 simulators, and enjoy a guided tour of the university's cutting-edge Computing research facilities.

Overall, the workshops were a fantastic opportunity for 11SA2 to broaden their digital horizons and engage with real-world technology in a fun and meaningful way.







#### **MEET OUR ICT PREFECTS**

We are delighted to introduce this year's team of ICT Prefects, all of whom are dedicated post-16 IT students. Each Prefect brings enthusiasm, strong technical skills and a genuine passion for supporting the digital life of our school. #### **YEAR 12 RIVER STUDIES TRIP**

Our GCSE Geography pupils braved the rain on their fieldwork trip to Crawfordsburn Country Park, where they collected data for their Unit 3 exam. Despite the wet weather, pupils showed great resilience and teamwork as they measured river velocity, depth, and width, and observed changes along the river's course. The trip provided valuable hands-on experience and helped develop their practical fieldwork and data analysis skills.





#### **YEAR 10 GIANTS CAUSEWAY TRIP**

Our Year 10 pupils enjoyed an engaging field trip to the Giant's Causeway, where they explored one of Northern Ireland's most iconic coastal landscapes. Pupils investigated how volcanic activity formed the basalt columns, identified examples of coastal erosion and deposition, and discussed how tourism is managed in this UNESCO World Heritage Site. It was a valuable opportunity to connect classroom learning with real-world geography.



#### **YEAR 9 NEWCASTLE TRIP**

Year 9 pupils spent the day studying coastal environments at Murlough Nature Reserve and in nearby Newcastle. At Murlough, they explored sand dunes, investigated plant adaptations, and created imaginative beach art using natural materials found on the coastline. In Newcastle, they examined how human activity and coastal defences help shape and protect the town. The trip provided an excellent introduction to fieldwork skills in a beautiful local setting.

Thanks to our generous school community, we collected an astonishing 387.7 kilos of food — that's 912 items!
